#### ORGANIZATION AND ROUTINE

Your school was not organized to teach you "Readin' ritin' and 'rithmetic' alone, although they are of prime importance. Everyone who wants to succeed socially must learn to respect the rights and property of others. For this reason a number of rules and regulations must be compiled to aid you during the year at A. H. S.

Care of the Building:

Several thousand students preceding you have taken good care of the school building. It is your duty to continue the good care. This is your school home. Treat it as home.

#### Library:

A. H. S. is fortunate to have an exceptionally well supplied library. More than \$1200 per year is spent for books and magazines. Most students are assigned to the library at least one period each week. If you wish to go more frequently you may do so by receiving permission from the librarian and study hall teacher.

Telephone:

Local calls may be made from the telephone booth in the basement at the rate of 10c each.

#### Bulletin Board:

Three permanent bulletin boards are located on the main floor. Notices of social events, meetings, and the like are placed on these boards. Under no conditions are placards or notices to be pasted or thumbtacked to the walls.

#### Requirements for Graduation:

The State Department of Instruction requires that 13 Carnegie credits be earned during the last three years of high school for graduation. This means that seniors should carry full schedules.

#### Lost and Found:

The office is the central point for articles either

lost or found. When an article is found, it should be taken to the office. If you lose something, inquire at the office.

Rating of Aspinwall High School:

The Aspinwall High School is a member of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This means that your school has met certain standards. In most cases your entrance into institutions of higher learning will be easier as a result of the high school's accreditation.

#### Lockers:

Lockers on the basement floor are to be used by the out-of-town students only. A locker assignment must be obtained from Mrs. Murphy. Use your own lock. Locks are sold in the office.

#### Parties and Dances:

Before any class or group may have a party or dance, the following steps must be taken:

1. The date must be cleared through Miss McCrum.

2. At least two faculty sponsors must be present. Fire Drills:

There will be periodic fire drills. Directions for the movement of students will be found on the blackboard in each room.

#### Air Raid Drills:

At an intermittent ringing of the class change bell, students will go to the following places:

Rooms 1, 2, 3.....gymnasium Rooms 4, 5.....basement hall Rooms 7, 8 ......hall, no farther than auditorium door Rooms 9, 10.....auditorium, under balcony Rooms 11, 12.....hall, no farther than auditorium door Rooms 13, 14, 15 ......upper hall, no farther than

In case of attack all students are to remain in school and remain sheltered because of the lethal rays until the proper persons give the "all clear" signal. The best protection from flying glass and other debris is lying face down with the head to a wall, although for the present students will not assume the prone position.

#### Assemblies:

In A. H. S. one assembly is held each week. These assemblies consist of guest speakers, performers, group singing, and one-act plays put on by students. Sometimes the school band holds band concerts for the students. When groups or classes have the programs, the quality of the program must be of the best.

Early Dismissals:

Permission for early dismissal must be obtained from the office upon presentation of a note from home.

#### Bells:

The morning late bell is at 8:40. The afternoon late bell is at 1:00. Dismissal for lunch is at 12:05.

#### School Colors:

Your school colors are maroon and white. Your school symbol is the Cavalier.

#### Smoking:

Ladies and gentlemen must not smoke within sight of the school building.

#### Lunch Hour:

Students are not permitted to go to the top floor during the noon lunch hour until 12:55. Lunchrooms are rooms 11, 12 and 5. Those wishing to study during the lunch hour may do so in Room 4.

#### Grounds:

The lawn and hedge around A. H. S. are beautiful as you can see. Please help to take care of them by not walking over them.

Supplies:

A tablet and pencil are issued at the beginning of each six-weeks period. Additional tablets and pencils can be obtained in the office at 5c each.

School Savings:

Bank day is each Monday at 8:40. Students wishing to start a savings account may do so by depositing any amount of money from a few cents to several dollars. Since banking has been started in A.H.S. the students have saved over \$20,000. Location of the Grade Building:

The Grade Building, in which the Art, Shop, and Mechanical Drawing classes are taught, is located at Fifth Street and Center Avenue.

School Publications:

CAVALIER is the school's yearbook and is published by a staff of students under the direction of Mr. C. Arthur Dahl and Mrs. Gladys M. Lindsay. Each year the staff conducts a campaign during which students submit photographs of school life to be printed in the yearbook.

CAVALCADE is the school's newspaper and the Journalism Class has charge of this publication. It is published mainly to inform students of events,

past, present, and future, around the school.

HANDBOOK is prepared by the Senior class to introduce students to their school at the beginning of each school year.

Absences:

Students must bring excuses from home following any days of absence.

Tardiness:

There is no penalty for the first tardiness. After the first you will be required to report early or remain after school.

#### CLUBS AND ACTIVITIES AT A.H.S.

Y-Teens—This club is affiliated with the Pittsburgh YWCA. It promotes better understanding among members. Junior or senior girls may join.

Cheerleaders—This group, sponsored by Miss Jean McCrum, leads cheers at all football and basketball games. They help promote better school spirit. Freshman, sophomore, junior, or senior girls may try out.

Rifle Club—Miss Jean McCrum sponsors the rifle club which aids its members in practicing shooting. Its members also enter competitions with other school clubs. Any freshman, sophomore, junior or senior who can shoot a score of 20

out of 50 may join.

Student Council—The vice-president of each class and one elected member from each homeroom make up the student council which aids in regulation of student activities and representing the student body in matters of administration. The members of this group must maintain a "C" average. Mr. C. Arthur Dahl is the council sponsor.

Pep Club — Freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior members of this club, sponsored by Miss Jean McCrum, promote better school spirit.

Art Club—Any student from 8th grade to seniors may join this club, sponsored by Miss Joanne Lovette, which gives students the opportunity to develop artistic ability.

Newspaper—The CAVALCADE, published by the Journalism classes taught by Miss Hazel Patterson, acquaints the student body with events

happening in and around the school.

Camera Club—Sponsored by Mr. Glenn Berkheimer, the camera club instructs students in photographic technique and procedure. Sophomores, juniors or seniors may join.

- Senior Nature Club—Sophomores, juniors, and seniors who join this club sponsored by Miss Beulah Frey have the opportunity to develop their interest and talents in biology.
- Varsity Club—Lettermen in basketball and football may join this club sponsored by Mr. Joseph MacCarthy.
- Speech Club—Miss Mary Ida Burnite conducts this club to supplement the Speech Class. It offers to any sophomore, junior, or senior interested, the opportunity to engage in radio speaking, debate, declamations, and dramatics.
- Science Club—Is sponsored by Mr. Glenn Berkheimer. The club takes many field trips in order to broaden their understanding of the scientific world. Sophomores, juniors, or seniors may join.
- Junior Nature Club—Organized by Miss Beulah Frey for the seventh and eighth grades. The club meets once each week at lunch time. The program consists of outside speakers or discussion of field trips. In recent years, the club members have taken many prizes in the Nature Contest at the Carnegie Museum.
- Junior Red Cross is under the direction of Miss Rosemarie Kavanagh. One of its activities last year was decorating the "hut" at the Veteran's Hospital just before Christmas.
- Senior Play—Each year in December the senior class presents its class play. Except for the direction of Miss Hazel Patterson all production work is done by members of the senior class. The cast is made up of members of the class who are chosen by try-outs.

Junior Play—In April the Juniors have the opportunity to display their dramatic talent in their class play. Miss Mary Ida Burnite directs the junior play whose cast is chosen by try-outs.

Kiwanis Award—The Kiwanis Club of Aspinwall awards a watch each May to the outstanding boy and girl in the graduating class. The winners are determined by balloting by the Junior and Senior classes. Traits considered are scholarship, character, citizenship, and personality.

American Legion Award — The American Legion award is given each year to the boy and the girl in the eighth grade who are most outstanding in desirable character and scholastic traits. The winners' names are engraved on a plaque in the main corridor of the school.

Dances-A school dance is usually held once a month. In September a "Back to School Dance" is sponsored by the Journalism classes; in October the Aspinwall Borough sponsors a "Halloween Dance"; the Pep Club sponsors a "Football Dance" in November; in December the senior class sponsors the "Christmas Dance," which is semi-formal; in January the Y-Teens sponsor a dance; the freshmen have a "Valentine Dance" in February; the "Sadie Hawkins Dance," which is held in March by the Rifle Club, gives the girls a chance to treat the boys (which is a welcome change in the eyes of the boys); in April the "Spring Dance" is held by the sophomores; in June the last dance of the year, the "Junior-Senior Prom," is held by the juniors in honor of the graduating class. It is a formal dance, open to juniors, seniors, and alumni only.


